BACKGROUND

This BSAP Public forum is intended to provide background to the BSAP process and recommendations, and will cover the major issues arising during that process. The forum should facilitate informed feedback to the Consultation document (deadline 7th April 2016 – see below).

The Environment Bureau and the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department of HKSAR Government have developed a Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan (BSAP) under the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD*). In preparing the BSAP for Hong Kong, the existing condition of biodiversity and practices for its conservation in Hong Kong were identified. Additional needed work and data gaps were also identified for compliance with the CBD and its Strategic Plan for Biodiversity 2011-2020 in light of local needs, issues and priorities. The Consultation document was developed through a participatory process in the form of a series of public engagement events, working and focus groups comprised of relevant experts in the community and in government.

*Convention on Biological Diversity and relevant targets: The CBD is an international treaty on the conservation of biodiversity, the sustainable use of its components, and the fair and equitable sharing of benefits deriving from the use of genetic resources. The Convention is overarching in that it emphasises the importance of biological diversity to human well-being, and embraces a wide range of issues including climate change, protection of traditional knowledge, gender mainstreaming, food security, human health, provision of clean air and water, local livelihoods, economic development and poverty alleviation, etc. Opened for signature in 1992, the Convention now has 194 Contracting Parties. The People's Republic of China joined the Convention in 1993.
